INTRODUCTION

Maidstone Churches Winter Shelter (MCWS) first opened its doors in December 2013 and has been operational each winter since then. We have just completed our 7th successful winter shelter.

MCWS opens for 3 months each winter, providing a hot meal, a bed in safe, warm surroundings for the night and a listening ear to the street homeless population of Maidstone. This year, the Shelter was opened for 80 consecutive nights with 612 beds being allocated over the period.

MCWS brings together churches, church members and volunteers (both secular and non-secular) to provide a safe environment for Maidstone's homeless community, throughout the coldest months of the year.

Our 'rolling night shelter' model means that the load is shared between church venues and teams. The shelter is hosted by 8 churches across Maidstone. Seven churches each offer their buildings for one night per week, where our guests are provided with a hot meal, a listening ear, a bed for the night and breakfast the following morning. The eighth church building is used to register our guests each afternoon. During registration guests are offered drinks, snacks and a time to just 'chill' in a warm, comfortable setting.

This winter, Maidstone Borough Council were once again able to provide temporary accommodation to many of our local homeless community over the winter months, following a Government grant, so the guest numbers in the shelters were a little lower than they have been in previous years. We were able to provide an evening meal and hospitality for some of those who were living in this temporary accommodation.

Unfortunately, due to Covid 19 (Coronavirus), we had to close our doors a week earlier than planned this winter to protect the health of our guests, staff and volunteers. However, we still registered 57 guests, 49 of whom stayed in the shelters overnight.

We also had the support of over 250 volunteers who gave their time, dedication and experience to enable the shelter to open each night and to provide the help and support needed by our guests. We simply could not run the Shelter without the amazing support of our volunteers and Venue Leads, who gave their time so generously.



Also joining the team were Les Ellis, Claire Kehily & Sonya Okubule as operational Project Workers. The team were supported by the Office Administrator and Volunteer Co-ordinator, Mandy Fuller, who provided invaluable and tireless support for both staff and volunteers.

FROM OUR CHAIRMAN

OUR TRUSTEES



GORDON MACKLEY

Gordon has been Chairman of the Trustees since March 2018. Gordon retired from work in 2016, after a 43 year-long career in railway operational management and transport information systems. He is a Licensed Lay Reader in a Church of England church near Maidstone. He has served as a Street Pastor in Maidstone since the start of the scheme in October 2008 and is currently a Team Leader. He became involved in the Shelter from the first year, serving as a volunteer.

This was our seventh year operating the Shelter and the year has been an extremely challenging one. As I write this, the whole world is in the grip of the Coronavirus pandemic. We endeavoured to keep the work of the shelter going to the end of March but in the light of the increasing restrictions and the medical advice, we decided that for reasons of safety we needed to close one week early. On the good side, our very close working and comments can be found relationship with Maidstone Borough Council (something we had made one of our priorities for the year) has resulted in there being less guests at the end of the Shelter than in previous years and arrangements have been made to assist those.

One priority from last year's review was to have the best working relationship with Maidstone Borough Council, referred to above. We shall again review the year to ensure that we provide the best service we can to our guests. Many of those who were earlier guests were provided with accommodation and all the relevant figures are in the report. Whilst figures are useful, it is the relationships that are forged and maintained which are of greater significance. Guests, volunteers and the paid staff have found the

experience very worthwhile and it is gratifying that new volunteers (of which we have had many this year) continue to find the experience uplifting. The groups of people involved have come from a variety of backgrounds including those with various religious beliefs and those without any such beliefs. Such fellowship has benefits for all concerned well beyond the Shelter itself. Some stories elsewhere in the report.

Another challenge, which in the present situation almost seems an era ago, was funding. Our funds had diminished to the extent that we were not sure we could finance the 2019/20 Shelter but it is amazing just how many Trusts there are out there working to fund organisations such as ours. After many applications were submitted a number bore fruit and we started this year's Shelter with enough money.

A future objective is to set up partnerships with businesses to maintain continuity of funding and to enhance understanding of homelessness within that community.

The end of the Shelter is always a time of mixed feelings and perhaps even more so this year. Whatever happens, the UK and indeed the world will be a different place by next winter. However many people have been housed this year, we know that there will always be those who become homeless in the future for many different reasons so I believe we shall need to open again next year in some manner and we shall need staff, volunteers and funds.

It only remains for me to say a very big thank you to the individuals who have supported us this year: as members of staff, volunteers, by donations, or by raising funds and to the various organisations who have contributed financially or by providing the venues for the Shelter and for the storage of our equipment. Very special thanks go to those still working in whatever capacity in the last weeks of the Shelter as the scale of the Coronavirus became more obvious, but also to those who felt that in their particular personal circumstances they had to step down. FROM OUR PROJECT MANAGER



GWYN McPHERSON

Gwyn was the Project Manager for Maidstone Churches Winter Shelter (MCWS) during both 2018-19 & 2019-20. She has been involved with MCWS since its inception and has undertaken roles as a Volunteer, Venue Lead (volunteer in charge of the venue), Project Worker and now Project Manager. Gwyn is an authorised Lay Minister in a Church of England church in Maidstone and has served as a Street Pastor in the town since 2011.

As Project Manager for Maidstone Churches Winter Shelter (MCWS), my job was to oversee the entire running of the shelter, along with the Trustees, to ensure it could open on time with sufficient volunteers and that everything was in place to enable the whole project to run smoothly.

I have been involved with MCWS since it first began in December 2013. I volunteered at the Quakers meeting House in Union Street for 2 years covering evening and overnight shifts, then became Venue Lead there for the next 2 years.

I found this experience very rewarding and eventually applied to be a Project worker for MCWS, a role which I undertook during the winter of 2017/18.

Following on from this, I was asked to consider being the Project Manager for 2018/19, a post which I accepted and I have been the Project Manager for the last 2 winters.

I feel that the benefits of the shelter are immense for our guests and it's great that we can provide a warm, safe place for them to sleep each night during the 3 months we are open. We also provide a hot dinner for our guests each evening, plus we provide additional meals for some guests who have been placed into temporary accommodation by Maidstone Borough Council. We also sometimes have dinner guests who've been in the shelter in previous years and just like to come back because they benefit from the company and support our volunteers provide.

That leads me on to thanking each and every one of our volunteers. The giving of your time, energy, support and patience is invaluable to the success of the shelter and we simply couldn't run without you.

Thanks also to our Project Team - Les, Claire, Sonya and Mandy, for their support, hard work and sense of humour.

I won't pretend that each evening in the shelter always runs smoothly, as there are most certainly difficulties sometimes. That's just part of life though and with the gathering together of so many people with so many different stories to tell, sometimes things go a bit awry!

This year's Shelter brought the new challenge of the Coronavirus pandemic, causing us to make the difficult decision to close a week early. Our volunteers were amazing and readily complied with the extra precautions we had to bring in to keep everyone safe. We were very blessed that the guests staying with us at the end all had somewhere to move on to – private rental, temporary Council accommodation or friends.

On the whole, I feel that this year's shelter was, once again, a success. The statistics for the shelter are included within this report and I hope you enjoy reading the stories some of our guests have shared with us about how they came to be in the shelter and how its support has impacted on their lives.

PLEASE TELL US A LITTLE BIT ABOUT YOUR BACKGROUND AND HOW/WHY YOU BECAME HOMELESS?

Unfortunately, I was a victim of abuse who had no choice but to be safer homeless. I also had a tough time with CPTSD (Complex Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome) which affected my whole life and ended my 4-year career. I couldn't quite find the motivation in my situation to continue.

HOW HAS MAIDSTONE CHURCHES WINTER SHELTER HELPED YOU?


When I came to register for the shelter I was anxious. I was listened to and accepted as 'me', someone worth helping.

They have completely changed my life. I could never repay the work of the amazing people who do what they do. Some would say a real first family.

DID YOUR STAY AT MAIDSTONE CHURCHES WINTER SHELTER SUPPORT YOU WITH THE NEED TO ENGAGE WITH OTHER AUTHORITIES, TO OBTAIN MORE PERMANENT ACCOMMODATION?

Yes, they supported me through the whole process.

As Kean was willing to engage with our local authority, through his support from MCWS, he was placed in temporary accommodation. He continued to come into the shelter each night for his dinner, company and continuing support though!



OUR AIMS AND HOW THEY WERE FULFILLED

PROVIDING HOSPITALITY AND OVERNIGHT SHELTER FOR HOMELESS PEOPLE IN THE WINTER MONTHS.

Shelter /ˈʃɛltə/

(noun) A place giving temporary protection from bad weather or danger.

Once again, Maidstone Churches Winter Shelter went way beyond the dictionary definition of the word shelter. Whilst we provided overnight shelter for our guests, we also ensured they were treated as individuals with varying needs, likes and interests.

MCWS met its first aim in many ways thanks to a team of passionate and enthusiastic volunteers and staff, who went above and beyond the call of duty. The Shelter supported 57 homeless people, 49 of whom became overnight guests. MCWS provided a service which included more than just evening hospitality and a bed, by giving assistance, support and encouragement that led to access to housing and employment opportunities.

ENGAGING MEMBERS OF CHURCHES IN MAIDSTONE AND OTHER VOLUNTEERS IN BUILDING SUPPORTIVE RELATIONSHIPS WITH HOMELESS PEOPLE IN MAIDSTONE, WITHOUT DISCRIMINATION ON THE GROUNDS OF RACE, GENDER, DISABILITY, SEXUAL ORIENTATION, OR RELIGION.

Our dedicated church members and volunteers alike extended a warm welcome to our overnight guests and some of those placed in temporary accommodation for an evening meal. During many conversations, new friendships were made as our volunteers humbly, attentively and caringly listened to the concerns, hopes and aspirations of our guests.

UNDERTAKING SUCH OTHER PURPOSES IN RELATION TO THE NEEDS OF HOMELESS PEOPLE AS THE TRUSTEES MAY FROM TIME TO TIME DETERMINE

MCWS worked closely with Maidstone Borough Council once again this winter, with meetings held to ensure that both organisations could support each other, in order to complement the support provided to our local homeless community. We also continued membership of the Kent Invicta Chamber of Commerce and contacted many local employers to seek support for the winter shelter, both financial and physical (volunteers).

SUPPORTING HOMELESS PEOPLE TO FIND LONG-TERM ACCOMMODATION.

Collaborating more closely with Maidstone Borough Council and Maidstone Day Centre, we were able to support our guests with accessing services including health and housing, applying for the right benefits, contacting and reconciling with family.



Christmas

Maidstone Churches Winter Shelter didn't open over the Christmas period during 2019, due to the experience of the last couple of winters where our guests have found family/sofas etc for comfort and support over the festive season. However, a hot meal was provided at Maidstone Salvation Army on Christmas Day, for any of Maidstone's homeless community who wished to attend.

Then on Boxing Day, MCWS and Maidstone Day Centre (Homeless Care) prepared dinner for our local homeless guests to enjoy. This was attended by 15 guests, all of whom enjoyed the food and shared company.



GUEST COMMENTS

STORY: DIONNE

PLEASE TELL US A LITTLE BIT ABOUT YOUR BACKGROUND AND HOW/WHY YOU BECAME **HOMELESS?**

I'm 32 years old and a mum to 3 children, aged 13, 6 & 4. My younger two children were adopted due to social services having no faith in me, so they didn't give me a chance. In 26 weeks my children were taken, separated from me and I won't see them again 'til they decide if they ever do want to see me.

This led to eviction, as 'my housing provider' didn't tell me about the arrears, over £800 worth of bedroom tax 'til I was already in debt with it. I was a broken woman!

In there (the shelter) I've found some of the kindest people. I was very lonely, now I feel I have places to turn and people to turn to. I felt safe and have found access to grief counselling through these kindhearted people.

HOW HAS MAIDSTONE CHURCHES WINTER SHELTER HELPED YOU?

They saved my life and I have found great friends.

ANYTHING ELSE YOU WOULD LIKE TO SAY?

Thanks for doing what you did. You're all very kind beyond belief. Your help and caring calmed me down and gave me soothing relief. Thank you for listening to me without judgement, speaking to me without prejudice, helping me without entitlement and understanding me without pretension. Thank you all so much!

Dionne is now in temporary accommodation, as MCWS helped her to engage with our local authority. She continued to come into the shelter for her dinner each night though, so that she could have a hot meal, company and continuing support from our staff and volunteers.

PLEASE TELL US A LITTLE BIT ABOUT YOUR BACKGROUND AND HOW/WHY YOU BECAME HOMELESS?

To get straight to the point, bad decisions taken at the 'right' moment led me to the point in which I had to ask for help.

HOW HAS MAIDSTONE CHURCHES WINTER SHELTER HELPED YOU?

First of all, I've been impressed by how well everything was organised. I would like to thank them all for their support.

Julian stayed in the shelter overnight and worked during the day. This enabled him to save towards a deposit on somewhere to live once the shelter closed.

No act of kindness, no matter how small is ever wasted.



A huge thank you goes out to the many people who provided food and meals throughout the winter shelter.



CORONAVIRUS

OUR PARTNERSHIPS

Due to the outbreak of coronavirus in China in December 2019 and its subsequent spread across borders, extra precautions were taken within our shelters to ensure the safety of our guests, volunteers and staff.

In accordance with the guidance supplied by the NHS, we ensured that everyone attending any of our venues received regular reminders to wash their hands and a Coronavirus poster describing precautions to be taken was displayed at each of our venues.

18 March 2020 – As the virus progressed and news of the spread increased, all of our volunteers were contacted to explain that the shelters would remain open but that, as we were in a rapidly changing situation, we would be reviewing the situation regularly and would make decisions based on Government advice and the local situation. We explained that, as far as possible, we would keep the shelter open until the planned finish date of 30th March, but would need to be in a position to plan ahead. We therefore asked volunteers to let us know asap if they felt unable to continue volunteering in the current circumstances, so that we could reorganize volunteer rotas as appropriate. We also provided a link to the current government guidelines regarding who should self-isolate and giving advice for people over 70.

19 March 2020 - As Government advice was changing daily, in response to the increasing spread of Coronavirus and the most up-to-date information available to them, our Trustees made the difficult decision to ask 'any of our overnight volunteers who are aged 70 or over and/or have any underlying condition that may impact their resistance to Coronavirus to not do their rostered overnight session.

We also reiterated that those in the 70+ age group and/or those with any underlying condition that may impact their resistance to the Coronavirus seriously consider whether to attend their remaining rostered sessions' and to let the office know if they were unable to volunteer any more this season.

22 March 2020 – Unfortunately, the spread of Coronavirus was increasing swiftly. Following Government advice to enforce Social Distancing and to close pubs/clubs/theatres and Venues where people choose to gather, our Trustees made the very difficult and sad decision that the shelter should close on the morning of Monday 23rd March, one week earlier than planned. This decision was necessary in order to follow current Government advice and to protect the health of our Guests, Volunteers and Staff.

However, Maidstone Borough Council had been working very hard in order to find accommodation for our remaining guests and, at this stage of the shelter, our overnight guests had reduced to between 3 and 5 each night. Of these, only two guests had nowhere to go, but managed to arrange to share a property with a friend for a few days until their rental property became available. Although it was very sad to close early, we are pleased to report that our remaining guests all had other places to go by the time we closed on the morning of 23rd March!

As in previous years, we have worked alongside local agencies in developing services and partnerships that are so vital to the success of the Shelter and the benefit of our guests.

The needs of our guests are complex and often require a bespoke multi-agency approach. Pivotal to the success of the Shelter is the work of our Project Team in building trust with our guests and providing additional support through our operational partners such as the Maidstone Day Centre and The MBC Street Homeless Outreach Team.

The agencies worked alongside the Shelter, on occasions attending registration and venues, to ensure that our Project Team could access their proven expertise in working with the local street-homeless community and that our guests could benefit from their professional support and advice.

We know our guests are particularly grateful to the Day Centre for providing the opportunity to use their shower and laundry facilities as well as food and clothing, without which the daily experience of living on the streets would be all the worse. Also for the support they receive from the staff there, with all the help they need to engage with other agencies.

Our partnership with Aylesford Priory has also continued to thrive as, along with a number of other wonderful people and churches across the town, they laundered our many sleeping bags.

Following their fundraising efforts, the group raised £659 for MCWS.

A group of children from year 4 kindly spent time collecting donations and putting together some rucksacks for the homeless, to help make the colder months a bit more bearable for those sleeping rough or spending a lot of time outside.





Also, many thanks go to the pupils, their parents/families and the staff at Valley Invicta Academy Trust for their amazing and generous donations, including funds raised from their Christmas play 'Jingle Bell Rock' to which one of our Trustees was invited. We are very grateful for their continued support of the winter shelter.


FUNDRAISING DINNER
